

Participant Training Level

Each session has a training level or levels assigned to it. Several of the trainings are suitable for more than one training level. What training level are you? Are you new to the field? Look for sessions that are Level 1 which is for Progressing Professionals. Have you been in the field awhile, have attended trainings, and have completed steps to improve quality? Look for sessions that are Level 2 which is for Skilled Professionals. Have you been in the field for several years and attended several trainings and have made significant steps in meeting key indicators of quality? Look for Level 3, Mastery Professional sessions. All sessions are open to all participants.

CEUs (Continuing Education Units)

CEUs from Des Moines Area Community College are also available for purchase. The charge is \$10. You will need to pick up a verification form at the registration desk when you arrive at the Institute. You can earn .7 CEUs for Friday and .6 CEUs on Saturday. You must attend a workshop each session time per day. You cannot mix workshops from Friday and Saturday together to qualify as one day. You must complete the verification form and return it to the Registration Desk before you leave the Institute to receive credit. No refunds will be given.

Ellen Galinsky

Ellen Galinsky is President and Co-Founder of Families and Work Institute. She helped establish the field of work and family life while conducting research at Bank Street College of Education, where she was on the faculty for 25 years. Ellen has authored more than 45 books and reports, including the highly acclaimed Mind in the Making: The Seven Essential Life Skills Every Child Needs, Ask the Children and the now classic The Six Stages of Parenthood. She has published over 125 articles in academic journals, books and magazines.

At FWI, she directs Mind in the Making, a project which includes professional development for early childhood educators, interactive learning opportunities for families, 0 to 8 systems building within the community schools context, a video series that highlights cutting edge early childhood research, the development of materials for pediatricians, and small grants to diverse learning community partners. Mind in the Making has had more than 990 million media impressions since the release of Ellen's book in April 2010.

Ellen is the recipient of numerous awards, including the 2004 Distinguished Achievement Award from Vassar College. She was elected a Fellow of the National Academy of Human Resources in 2005. A popular keynote speaker, she appears regularly at national conferences, on television and in the media, including the CBS Evening News with Katie Couric, World News Tonight and Oprah.

A leading authority on work family issues, Ellen was a presenter at the 2000 White House Conference on Teenagers and the 1997 White House Conference on Child Care; a planner and participant at the March 2010 White House Forum on Workplace Flexibility; and she worked with the Women's Bureau of the Department of Labor on the national and regional forums on flexibility that continued the work of the White House Forum.

In addition, Ellen has served as the elected President of NAEYC (National Association for the Education of Young Children), the world's largest professional association of early childhood educators.

Keynote Address

Best Practices for Supporting the Essential Life Skills of Young Children in Early Care and Education

This presentation will focus on the importance of life-skills learning in early childhood and beyond when it comes to future success in life. The key skills, based on executive function skills, include focus and self-control, perspective taking, communicating, making connections, critical thinking, taking on challenges, and self-directed, engaged learning. Mind in the Making (MITM) has gone beyond a book, becoming a national early childhood education movement. MITM, part of the preeminent New York-based think tank Families and Work Institute, is now a national initiative to share scientifically based research and applicable strategies for promoting life skills in communities across the country. This includes hands-on training for educators and parents, partnerships with community leaders and schools, and a series of forums and lectures throughout the nation.

This session will "walk the talk." It will be set up to promote knowledge and Life Skills among adults, using Developmentally Appropriate Practice. See how New Mexico has used the momentum for Common Core State Standards to infuse CCSS, Mind in the Making Life Skills, and Developmentally Appropriate Practice in a compelling way. Learn numerous specific activities that directors, teachers, and parents can do to promote IELS, Life Skills, and DAP.

Al "Mr. Al" Rasso has been traveling throughout the country presenting workshops, consulting with school districts, performing conference keynotes and entertaining children and families since 1988. His Bachelor's degree in Elementary Education and his Master of Instruction degree in Early Childhood together with his musical background and talents make him a versatile entertainer and educator.

Mr. Al has written, produced, and recorded twenty children's albums, two videos and one teacher resource book. He has over ten years of classroom teaching experience working with children from infancy through early childhood.



Susan has organized Week of the Young Child events in the lowa City area, providing a venue for our twenty early childhood organizations to network and advocate with over 1,000 children, families, stakeholders and policymakers.

An insightful leader, effective planner, and successful administrator, Susan led our board with quiet dignity and natural humility as President from 2010-2012. During her tenure, several events were hosted, including the event that inaugurated the idea of 2000 days which later became the catch-phrase for lowa's early childhood system development efforts. Susan's affirming, supportive nature and collaborative spirit was instrumental in these successes. For the first fifteen of those years, Rhonda served as superwoman, the single employee of the organization, fulfilling the roles of business manager, conference planner, membership services specialist, newsletter editor, bookkeeper, administrative assistant to the governing board, chairperson of grant selection, and goodwill ambassador for the work of Iowa AEYC. As the organization grew and Rhonda acquired ten new office colleagues, she graciously and willingly welcomed each of us into her circle of friends.

Over these years, the Association and membership grew and changed, thanks in no small part to Rhonda's attention to detail, sharp organizational skills, and capacity for remembering every person and every important deadline that needed attention. She was the "behind the scenes hero" to ensure our work moved forward, recruiting membership, supporting new chapters, organizing our fall and spring institutes and our play and accreditation efforts. Whenever we asked, "What year did lowa AEYC do ____?" or "Where can we find ____?, she always knew the answer and could provide the information immediately.

Board members since the early 1990s have depended on Rhonda to support their work and their leadership development. She created our "red books", a large board orientation manual that supports the full engagement of our board members. Iowa AEYC 2013 Children's Champion Award

Senator Tom Harkin



The Iowa Association for the Education of Young Children selects one worthy Iowan as Children's Champion every year, recognizing significant public impact on behalf of young children in our state.

This year, we are pleased to recognize our U.S. Senator, Tom Harkin. Senator Harkin has represented Iowa in the US Senate since 1985 and during that time he has been a relentless advocate for children and their families. Senator Harkin introduced the Americans with Disabilities Act in 1990 and hasn't stopped being a voice for our nation's most vulnerable.

Just a couple highlights:

- Secured funding to establish and improve early education programs across lowa.
- Secured a combined total of more than \$4 billion in the American Recovery and
 Reinvestment Act (the Recovery Act) for Head Start and the Child Care and Development Block
 Grant to increase the number of children receiving early childhood care and education, and to
 improve the quality of care through early childhood workforce development and
 facility upgrades.
- Introduced the Safe Babies Act, legislation that helps safeguard kids during their pivotal development years. It requires screening infants and toddlers within the foster system for developmental delays and chronic health problems, and allows children to achieve safe permanency with their parents or other loving adults.
- Has made early childhood education a major focus of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act reauthorization.

Most recently he has introduced a bill to reauthorize the Child Care and Development Block Grant of 1990. He also provided increases in early childhood education in the recent appropriations bill addressing health and education issues.

Senator Harkin currently serves as Chairman of the Health, Education, Labor, And Pensions Committee AND Chairman of the Labor, Health and Human Services, and Education Appropriations Committee. This puts our Senator in a very strong position to help many lowans. Earlier this year, Senator Harkin announced his intentions to retire from the US Senate. During his speech he highlighted early childhood education and made sure he would make it a key part of his last two years in the US Senate.

We are proud to call Senator Harkin an Iowa Children's Champion!

The State Children's Champion Award recognition was initiated in 2006 by the Region VII Head Start Association Advocacy Committee as an effort to recognize individuals who make valuable contributions to the lives of children and families across the four Region VII respective states. Dianne Casto



The Region VII Head Start Association Tom Mayer Award of Excellence was initiated to recognize outstanding contributions in the Head Start field.

Dianne Casto, retired director of NICAO Head Start, served as a Head Start professional for 39 years. She was a tireless volunteer throughout her Head Start career and continues to serve young children as a volunteer.

During rapid Head Start expansion from 1988-1994, Dianne championed the cause of getting services to the very rural north Iowa population. Dianne

worked with local Early Childhood Iowa (ECI) boards to understand appropriate practice for children. She found ways to leverage funds from local ECI boards to cover the cost of transportation for our most isolated families.

During her time as a Head Start director, Dianne developed and nurtured strong staff members who were able to work autonomously and maintain quality services throughout a challenging geographic service area.

Dianne was able to develop a collaborative partnership with another Community Action Program to provide Early Head Start services to a rural area, leveraging state dollars in a state pilot project. Even though that pilot project was discontinued, Dianne has been able to keep the project going through alternative funding sources.

Dianne's role in the local, state, and national Jaycee's is really the Excellence in Leadership role. At a time when child care and business were not even on the radar, Dianne was championing the cause of business involvement in quality care initiatives. She was instrumental in developing a strong connection with local service organizations to support local Head Start programs. The Lion's Club in North Iowa was one of the first organizations to assist with vision screening for all Head Start enrolled children. Throughout her nine county region, Dianne has made connections with Lion's groups and nurtured that relationship throughout the state. As the National Vice President for Jaycee's, Dianne took the Head Start message to the broader business community. Dianne currently serves as secretary on the Iowa Association for the Education of Young Children board.

Dianne's tireless work as a Head Start member and community volunteer has touched and changed the lives of countless young children and their families. The Iowa Head Start is proud to honor Dianne Casto as the 2013 Tom Mayer Award Nominee.

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
